

Browne Jacobson and the National Association of Head Teachers publish new guidance for faith schools faced with joining or becoming an academy trust

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New guidance is published this week to provide information about what it means for a faith school to become an academy or to join a trust.

Developed jointly by Browne Jacobson and the National Association of Head Teachers (NAHT), the guidance entitled '[Understanding Faith Academy Trusts](#)' is designed to provide senior leaders in faith schools, with factual information about the implications and mechanics of academy status – aiming to assist anybody involved in conversations around legal and governance structures relating to their faith school.

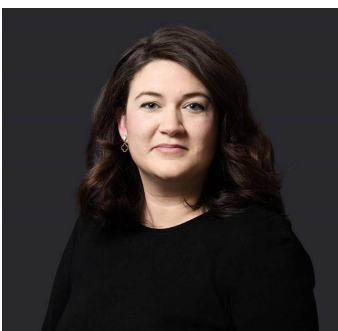
